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# INTRODUCTION

It's also a privilege to be able to welcome Brian Briggs, frontman of the much-loved band Stornoway, and poet Paul Henry. The pair will be performing their astonishing new collaboration, *The Glass Aisle*, at Priory Theatre on 18<sup>th</sup> September - one of only a handful of opportunities to see the show in 2017.

Alongside these events, we've also added some new strands to the programme this year. One thing we're particularly proud of is our Spotlight Series, which will showcase the work of five outstanding emerging writers and musicians. We've also expanded our programme of fringe events, have added a number of family-friendly workshops (come and make your own dreamcatcher!), and are working with some wonderful local organisations to host three week-long exhibitions. Be sure to check out the work of Amadeus Long, a brilliant young street photographer, which is being exhibited in The Gallery.

# **FIESTA**

Sunday 17th September • 11am – 6pm • Abbey Fields, Kenilworth • Free Entry

Fiesta is an event for people of all ages, held in the beautiful Abbey Fields in the heart of Kenilworth. This free, one-day event features live music and theatre, interactive activities, food, drink and a huge range of things to do, see and hear:

- \* Live music from brilliant bands including Treetop Flyers, Low Chimes, Tom Speight, William the Conqueror, Kizzy Crawford and Speak, Brother (see overleaf for more details).
- \* Theatre performances throughout the day, curated by Live & Local. Catch Liberty Rocks Arts' production of 'Arc', an intergalactic detective story, which takes place onboard the Marie Celestial, a mechanical play space, stage set, aerial circus rig and flame thrower (yep, you read that correctly!). You can also see Spiltmilk's new production, 'Somewhere on Sea' and Bootleg Puppets' Shakespearean adaptation, 'Caliban on the Rocks'. If that's not enough, hear tales from around the world in The Wherever People's magical story carriage. Oh, and keep an eye out for a stegosaurus named Lost Luggage...
- \* Free interactive activities for children of all ages: learn and play with ArtySplats, TeddyCation and Sing & Sign for babies; make some noise in the Music Maze; get stuck in with Gabrielle's Pottery and Warwick Arts Centre's 3D sculpture-making workshops; sit back and relax in the Kenilworth Books storytelling den; try your hand at clay modelling and, if you're feeling especially adventurous, have a go at tree climbing!
- \* Food & drink: delicious street food and tasty treats from vendors including KusKus Foods, Smoking Pig, Time for Tea and Go Go Ice Cream. There'll also be local craft ales, supplied by Church Farm Brewery, plus a variety of tipples from the Wine Tuk-Tuk, Secco Cart and Pimms Plus.
- \* Arts & crafts stalls: with everything from pottery to paintings, jewellery to jams and books to the 'Kids' Bizarre', we're sure you'll find something special to take away with you.





#### TREETOP FLYERS

The London-based band have been making a name for themselves since 2009 and were crowned winners of Glastonbury's Emerging Talent Competition in 2011. They have released two critically-acclaimed albums through Loose Music (a sign of quality if ever there was one!) and have earned a reputation for being a phenomenal live band.



#### LOW CHIMES

Described by BBC 6 Music's Marc Riley as 'nothing short of fabulous,' this alt-folk five-piece from Stroud have a unique and enchanting sound. With two acclaimed EPs released under a previous name (Hot Feet) and a string of well-received live dates under their belt, it's no wonder that their debut album, due for release in October, is so highly anticipated.



#### TOM SPEIGHT

After a spell away from music, Tom has released four EPs in the last 12 months, racking up over 12 million Spotify plays in the process. His latest single, 'My My My', made its way onto the BBC Radio 2 playlist, earning praise from Jo Whiley and Graham Norton. With a warm, infectious sound and a taste for great collaborations, Tom is one to watch.



#### WILLIAM THE CONQUEROR

Hailing from Cornwall, multi-instramentalists Ruarri Joseph, Harry Harding and Naomi Holmes channel classic blues and singer-songwriter influences through a grunge/indie filter. Their debut album, Proud Disturber of the Peace, was released through Loose Music earlier this summer and is one of our favourite records of the year so far.



## KIZZY CRAWFORD

Kizzy's solo career began just a few years ago, but she's already getting recognition for her unique fusion of bilingual soul-folk jazz. Described by Huw Stephens as a 'real talent', Kizzy has received airplay on BBC Radio 1, BBC Radio 6 Music and BBC Radio 4, and has performed live at festivals including Glastonbury, Hay and Cheltenham Jazz.



#### SPEAK, BROTHER

Winners of our 2017 unsigned band competition, the Midlands-based five-piece boast a powerful indie-folk-rock sound, with driving melodies and heartfelt lyrical storytelling. With a national tour planned for later this year and a debut album due for release in Spring 2018, expect to hear a lot more from Speak, Brother.



# BRIAN BRIGGS & PAUL HENRY: THE GLASS AISLE

We're honoured to be joined by two magnificent artists for an evening of poetry and song.

**Brian Briggs** is a singer-songwriter-ornithologist, known to many as the lead singer and lyricist for the band Stornoway. Stornoway were the first unsigned band to appear on *Later... With Jools Holland* and they subsequently toured worldwide and enjoyed main stage appearances at festivals including Glastonbury, Latitude and Isle of Wight.

**Paul Henry** is the author of eleven books of verse, including *The Brittle Sea* and *Boy Running*. A Writing Fellow at the University of South Wales, he has read and performed his work at festivals across Europe and also in the USA and Asia.

Together, Brian and Paul will be performing an astonishing new collaborative piece, 'The Glass Aisle' - a long poem with songs, set on a stretch of canal above Crickhowell. Two presences loom in the poem: Marconi, who conducted his experiments for radio on this particular part of the canal, and an old union workhouse, now converted into houses. The two come together in the shape of a telephone engineer who is trying to connect a broken telegraph wire across the water, to the site of the old workhouse.

The line to the old workhouse is down.

The telegraph pole is inside a tree,
the engineer wedged like a sacrifice
inside the branch's latticework ...

With its songs composed 'out of the poem' and brought to life in Brian's clear tenor, this work breaks down the borders between the poem and the song lyric while offering a haunting elegy to the displaced.



# SARAH MOSS AND KIT DE WAAL IN CONVERSATION WITH ALEX CLARK


We are delighted to be bringing together two of the most distinctive voices in contemporary British fiction to discuss their work, in conversation with respected journalist and critic Alex Clark.

Sarah Moss is the author of five critically acclaimed novels, including Cold Earth (2009), Night Waking (2011), Bodies of Light (2014) and Signs for Lost Children (2015). Her most recent work, The Tidal Zone (2016), is a poignant, funny and engrossing exploration of family life, centred around a cataclysmic event and its aftermath. Sarah been described by the Independent as 'one of the best British novelists writing today', and by Margaret Drabble as 'a writer of exceptional gifts'. She is currently Professor of Creative Writing at the University of Warwick.

Kit de Waal was born in Birmingham to an Irish mother and Caribbean father and worked for 15 years in criminal and family law. Her writing has received numerous awards, including the Bridport Flash Fiction Prize and the SI Leeds Literary Reader's Choice Prize in 2014. Kit's debut novel, My Name is Leon (2016), is a heart-breaking story about love, identity and learning to overcome unbearable loss. The book is a Times and international best seller and was shortlisted for the Costa First Novel Award (2016), the Desmond Elliot Prize (2017) and for 'Debut Book of the Year' at the 2017 British Book Awards.

Alex Clark is a critic, journalist and broadcaster, who writes on a wide range of subjects for publications including the Guardian, the Observer and the Times Literary Supplement. A highly respected voice on contemporary literature, Alex has judged many literary awards, including the 2008 Man Booker Prize. She regularly chairs live events and is currently the Artistic Director of Words & Literature at the Bath Festival.





## ALYS FOWLER & WILL ASHON: JOURNEYS THROUGH NATURE

Join us on a voyage through forest and waterways with two fabulous authors, who'll be discussing their latest critically acclaimed works of creative non-fiction.

Alys Fowler is an award winning journalist and passionate gardener. She is the author of several books and writes a weekly column on gardening for Guardian Weekend magazine. Her latest book, *Hidden Nature*, sees Fowler set out in an inflatable kayak to explore Birmingham's canal network, full of little-used waterways where huge pike skulk and kingfishers dart. It's a book about noticing the wild everywhere, and about what it means to see beauty where you least expect it. Beautifully written, honest and very moving, *Hidden Nature* is also the story of Alys Fowler's emotional journey and her coming out as a gay woman. Above all, the book is about losing and finding, exploring familiar places and discovering unknown horizons.

Will Ashon is a novelist, former music journalist and founder of the Big Dada imprint of Ninja Tune Records. His debut non-fiction book, *Strange Labyrinth*, was published by Granta in April 2017 and has been described by The Guardian as a 'glorious... anarchic hymn to the scruffy edgeland of Epping Forest'. In *Strange Labyrinth*, Ashon delves into the forest on a quest to discover more about person and place. The book is a unique blend of landscape writing, political indignation, cultural history and wit, and Ashon writes brilliantly about the world-renowned artists and fading celebrities, robbers, lovers, ghosts and poets that he gets to know along the way.

The event will be chaired by Dr. Victoria Mier, owner of the Tree House Bookshop in Kenilworth.







# **GWILYM SIMCOCK: SOLO PIANO**

Gwilym Simcock is one of the most gifted pianists and imaginative composers on the European scene. An internationally respected artist, Gwilym moves effortlessly between jazz and classical music, and has been widely lauded as a pianist of 'exceptional', 'brilliant' and 'dazzling' ability. To quote jazz legend Chick Corea: 'Gwilym's an original... a creative genius.'

A former winner of the Perrier Award and BBC Jazz and British Jazz 'Rising Star' Awards, Gwilym was the first jazz musician to be selected for the BBC Radio 3 New Generation Artist scheme, and he has also previously been named the All Party Parliamentary Jazz Awards' Musician of the Year.

His debut album, *Perception*, was nominated for Best Album in the BBC Jazz Awards 2008 and received critical acclaim at home and abroad. His 2011 album, *Good Days at Schloss Elmau*, was nominated for the prestigious Barclaycard Mercury Prize.

Gwilym has toured extensively with a host of world-class artists including Dave Holland, Lee Konitz, Bob Mintzer, Bobby McFerrin, and classical virtuoso Nigel Kennedy. He spent much of last year on tour as part of Pat Metheny's quartet, and will be picking up that role again later this year.

Here, Gwilym will be playing solo, on a grand piano, in the beautfully renovated St. John's Church. It promises to be a very special evening.



# AN EVENING OF POETRY, CURATED BY NINE ARCHES PRESS

Since its inception in 2008, Rugby-based Nine Arches Press has made waves as an independent publishing press, boasting an impressive and inclusive roster of new and emerging writers in the UK. We're thrilled to be partnering with Nine Arches to host a very special evening of poetry readings, featuring a stellar cast of established and emerging poets: Rishi Dastidar, Jacqueline Saphra, Cynthia Miller, Ben Bransfield and Marvin Thompson.

Rishi Dastidar's poetry has been published by the Financial Times, Tate Modern and the Southbank Centre amongst many others, and has featured in the anthologies Adventures in Form (Penned in the Margins) and Ten: The New Wave (Bloodaxe). He is a consulting editor at The Rialto magazine, a member of the Malika's Poetry Kitchen collective, and a fellow of The Complete Works - the Arts Council funded programme for BAME poets in the UK. Rishi has been described by Daljit Nagra as "one of the most ingenious, modern, thrilling, hilarious and tender poets writing today."

Jacqueline Saphra's poetry has been widely published and her plays performed on stage and television. Jacqueline's first full collection, *The Kitchen of Lovely Contraptions* (flipped eye, 2007) was developed with funding from Arts Council England and nominated for The Aldeburgh First Collection Prize. Her latest collection, *All My Mad Mothers*, was published by Nine Arches Press this Spring. Jacqueline has been Poet in Residence for both Transport for London and Good Housekeeping Magazine.

Alongside Jacqueline and Rishi, we are delighted to be welcoming three poets who were featured in the 2016 Primers volume. The Primers scheme, which was launched by Nine Arches Press and The Poetry School, is a nationwide programme which showcases exciting new voices in poetry. After receiving hundreds of anonymous entries, selecting editors Jane Commane and Jacob Sam-La Rose decided on three poets: Ben Bransfield, Cynthia Miller and Marvin Thompson. All three will be offering snapshots into their work at this event.



# JOHN SMITH + SUPPORT FROM HATTIE WHITEHEAD

John Smith is told almost every day that he has the most common name in the world. Aside from the name, however, nothing about him is commonplace. Over the last few years, John has played to audiences across the globe, in living rooms, festival tents and sold-out concert halls. Anybody who has seen him live will be able to vouch for the unique talent he possesses.

John first made his name on the folk circuit, opening for folk greats John Martyn, Davy Graham and John Renbourn, and has since opened shows for Iron and Wine, Tinariwen, Gil Scott-Heron and Ben Howard. He has guested with artists such as Jackson Browne, Martin Carthy, Richard Hawley and Jarvis Cocker, and in his occasional role as sideman he has played guitar for artists including David Gray, Lisa Hannigan, Lianne La Havas, Joe Henry and Joan Baez.

He has released five albums, the latest of which - *Headlong* - was released earlier this summer to widespread acclaim. *Headlong* is an album which, as Uncut has written, is 'testament to how powerful his music can be'.

John is a genius guitar player and an extraordinary songwriter, offering fresh takes on love, loss and (every now and again) mythic murder ballads. Add to the mix his honey-on-gravel vocals, and it's no wonder that he's capable of selling out shows wherever he goes. It is a privilege to be welcoming him to our festival for a one-off, intimate show in the beautiful Tudor Stables at Kenilworth Castle.

John will be supported by Hattie Whitehead. Inspired originally by the earlier sounds of folk artists such as James Taylor, Nick Drake, John Martyn and Joni Mitchell, London-based Hattie has developed a distinctive and enchanting sound, characterised by pure vocals, clever compositions and heartfelt lyrics.

The release of Hattie's debut EP, Home, prompted radio play from stations including BBC and Amazing Radio, as well as a sell-out launch gig at St Pancras Old Church in London. Highlights of Hattie's journey since the release of Home have included bookings at top UK festivals such as Latitude, Secret Garden Party and Cambridge Folk Festival, and winning third prize in Glastonbury's Emerging Talent Competition in 2016.

Preti's highly anticipated debut novel, We That Are Young, was published in August on Galley Beggar Press. The book is a modern-day King Lear, set in India against the backdrop of the 2011-12 anti-corruption riots. Reviews so far have been exceptional: the Sunday Times have labelled it 'one of the most exquisite and original novels of the year.'


Little Deaths has been hailed as 'phenomenal', 'searing' and 'mesmerising', and has been long-listed for a host of literary awards since its publication in January 2017.



#### AMADEUS LONG

Sunday 17th - Saturday 23rd September • The Gallery • Free Entry

Anyone can take a picture on a mobile phone these days. Almost everybody does. And yet nobody is doing what Amadeus Long is doing.

Amadeus is one of the finest young street photographers in the UK. He is also the leading light of a new generation of photographers using their cameraphones as their tool and embracing social media to share their talents.

Mostly taken in and around the streets of London, Amadeus' photographs are a testament to the considered and patient skills of a talented photographer. Echoes of Henri Cartier Bresson are evident in his work, not least in the vivid sense of geometry in Amadeus' images, and in his ability to capture beauty in the urban environment.

We are delighted that Amadeus will be hosting his debut exhibition as part of our 2017 festival, in association with The Fynn and The Gallery.

The exhibition will open on Sunday 18th September, with a launch event taking place from 5pm - 9pm, and will be available to view throughout the festival week.

# **EXHIBITIONS**

## RHIANNON PARNIS

Each year, we commission an illustrator to develop bespoke artwork for our festival. For 2017, we're lucky to have been working with Rhiannon Parnis.

Rhiannon is an illustrator based in Cardiff, recently graduated from Cardiff School of Art and Design with a BA (hons) in Illustration. She has worked on editorial and narrative-based projects, most recently illustrating a short story for The Cardiff Review. Her work is painterly and subtle, aiming to create atmospheric and emotive images through the use of a range of media, including inks, gouache and coloured pencil.

In 2015, Rhiannon's entries for the Folio Society & House of Illustration competition were selected as part of a longlist and exhibited at House of Illustration in London. She has also been involved in various exhibitions including Within/Without, a student led group exhibition at PAPER Arts Bristol, and Composite, a group exhibition in the disused office spaces of Brunel House in Cardiff.

We asked Rhiannon to create a series of pieces with a central theme of journeys, using the swift as a motif. Swifts are the ultimate migratory bird, often travelling over 20,000 km each year in an annual pilgrimage from Africa to the UK (incidentally, there's a beautiful chapter on swifts in Rob Cowen's Common Ground).

A selection of pieces that Rhiannon has created for Kenilworth Arts Festival will be on display in The Orangery throughout the festival week.

Festival-goers will also be able to view and buy Rhiannon's artwork at Fiesta.

# TAKE A SEAT TRAIL

Take A Seat is a collaboration between Kenilworth Arts Festival, students from Kenilworth School and local businesses. For this project, students have devised a series of interactive installations, based around the theme of migration and inspired by Nicola Davies' poem, *The Day the War Came*.

- 7) Shakespeare Hospice, Abbey End: Examine the migration patterns of 12 different animals in a display made by Science students.
- 8) Bliss, Millar Court: Blast off into space with the Space Club, who have made a rocket launch pad and mobile solar system.
- 9) The Orangery, Kenilworth: Listen to slam poetry created and recorded by KS<sub>3</sub> English students.
- 10) Kenilworth Books, Talisman Square:
  Try a quiz about food, textiles and product design materials from around the world made by Technology students while sitting on a specially designed chair.
